During the fall of 2024, I had the incredible opportunity to study abroad in Ecuador, a life changing experience that significantly enriched both my academic and personal growth. As a student pursuing a major in Languages and International Business at Clemson University, I completed three Spanish language courses while abroad, all of which transferred over and satisfied key degree requirements. More importantly, the immersive environment in Ecuador allowed me to develop a deeper cultural understanding and appreciation that extended far beyond the classroom.

Living and studying in a Latin American environment brought the Spanish language to life in a way that no textbook ever could. Beyond Quito, I explored several iconic Andean destinations. One highlight was Otavalo, home to one of the largest and most famous indigenous markets in South America, where I admired intricate handmade textiles and crafts. I also visited Cotopaxi National Park, where I marveled at the snow-capped Cotopaxi Volcano. Another unforgettable destination was Quilotoa, a volcanic crater lake with mesmerizing turquoise waters, surrounded by rugged cliffs and scenic trails. Further south, I ventured to Baños, a small town known for its waterfalls, hot springs, and adventurous activities like zip lining and hiking to the "Swing at the End of the World." Each destination offered a unique glimpse into Ecuador's natural beauty and cultural diversity.

Throughout my time in Ecuador, I met a variety of people who enriched my experience in countless ways. From fellow students to local residents, I formed meaningful connections

that have continued even after returning home. These friendships, built on shared experiences and cultural exchange, have become one of the most valuable outcomes of my study abroad journey.
